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Background and Purpose

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Population Affairs (OPA) hosted the 2022 virtual Teen Pregnancy Prevention Grantee Conference on Tuesday, July 26 – Thursday, July 28, 2022.

The Teen Pregnancy Prevention (TPP) Program is a national, evidence-based grant program that funds diverse organizations working to prevent teen pregnancy across the United States. OPA invests in the implementation of effective TPP programs and provides funding to develop and evaluate new and innovative approaches to prevent teen pregnancy, prevent sexually transmitted infections (STIs) among adolescents, and promote optimal health.

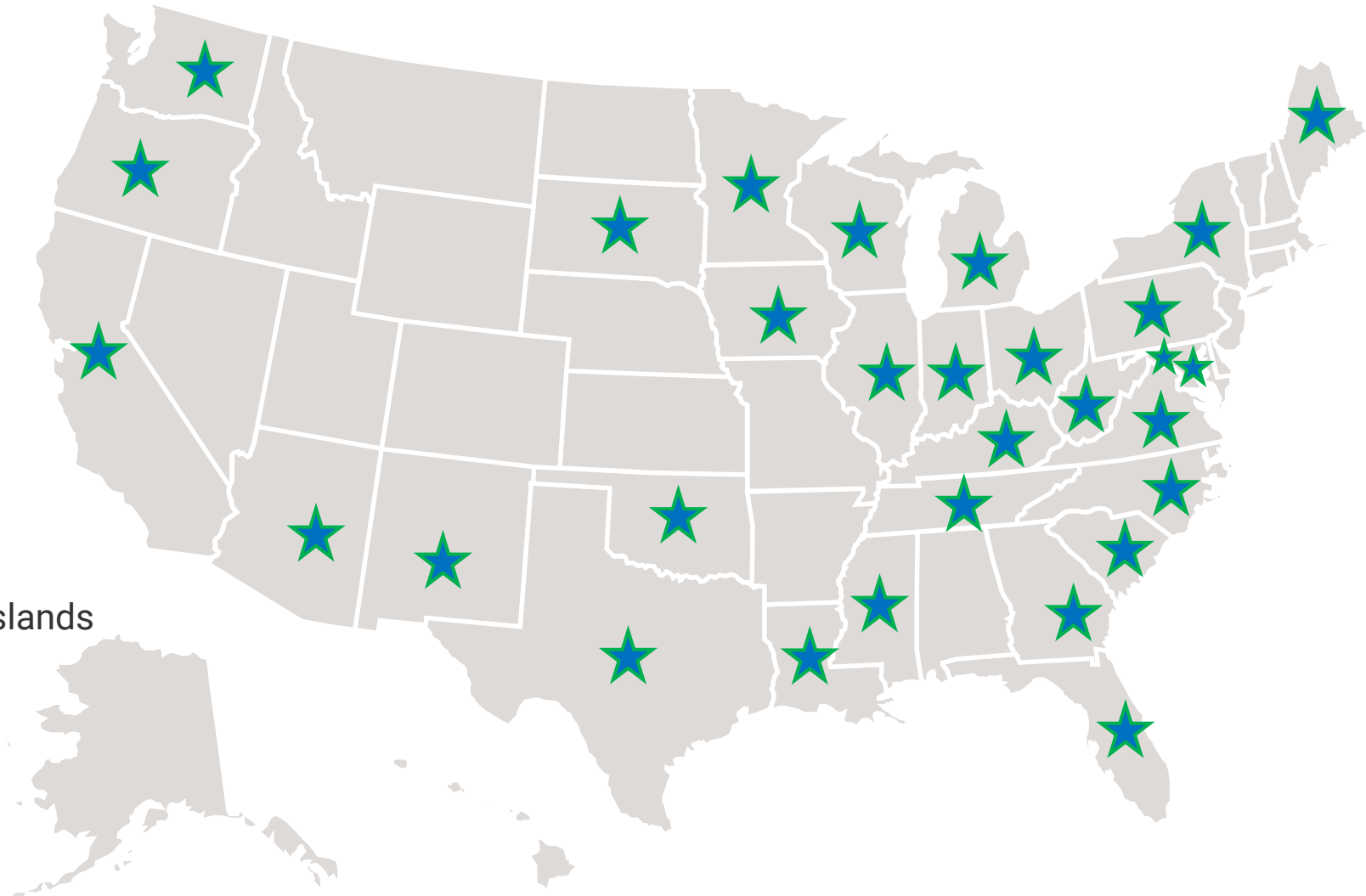

Sessions

Call for Abstracts

Abstracts were called to focus on **innovative practices, strategies, research, and emerging trends in the fields of teen pregnancy and adolescent sexual health**. Abstracts were encouraged to emphasize ways that federal grantees can strengthen their teen pregnancy prevention programs and advance health equity among youth and in their communities.

Submissions were scored by a review team consisting of OPA staff and members of the Grantee Conference Committee (GCC) using a double-blind process. Scoring was based on presentation content, format, and delivery.

The results of the 2022 Teen Pregnancy Prevention Grantee Conference Call for Abstracts, included:

- 108 Submissions
- 224 Presenters
- 54 Breakouts Sessions
- 28 Posters
- 3 Plenaries

Selected Sessions

Through the Call for Abstracts, NORC strategized with OPA to develop a schedule of sessions that aligned with one or more of the four conference tracks:

1. **Program Implementation** - Sessions in this track focused on program implementation and methods (e.g., systems thinking, Human Centered Design, etc.) for ensuring high-quality intervention design, network building, recruitment, programming and/or services.
2. **Building Quality** - Sessions in this track focused on grantee and federal evaluation efforts, including innovation testing and refinement strategies, evaluation methods and techniques, and equitable data collection and analyses
3. **Community, Partner and Stakeholder Engagement** - Sessions in this track focused on best practices for engaging with and connecting youth, parents/caregivers, community stakeholders, systems, and other key partners.
4. **Sustainability** - Sessions in this track focused on strategies for ensuring sustainable projects and services, as well as opportunities for strategic communication and dissemination.

The 2022 TPP Grantee Conference hosted **54** Breakouts Sessions, **28** Posters, and **3** Plenaries.

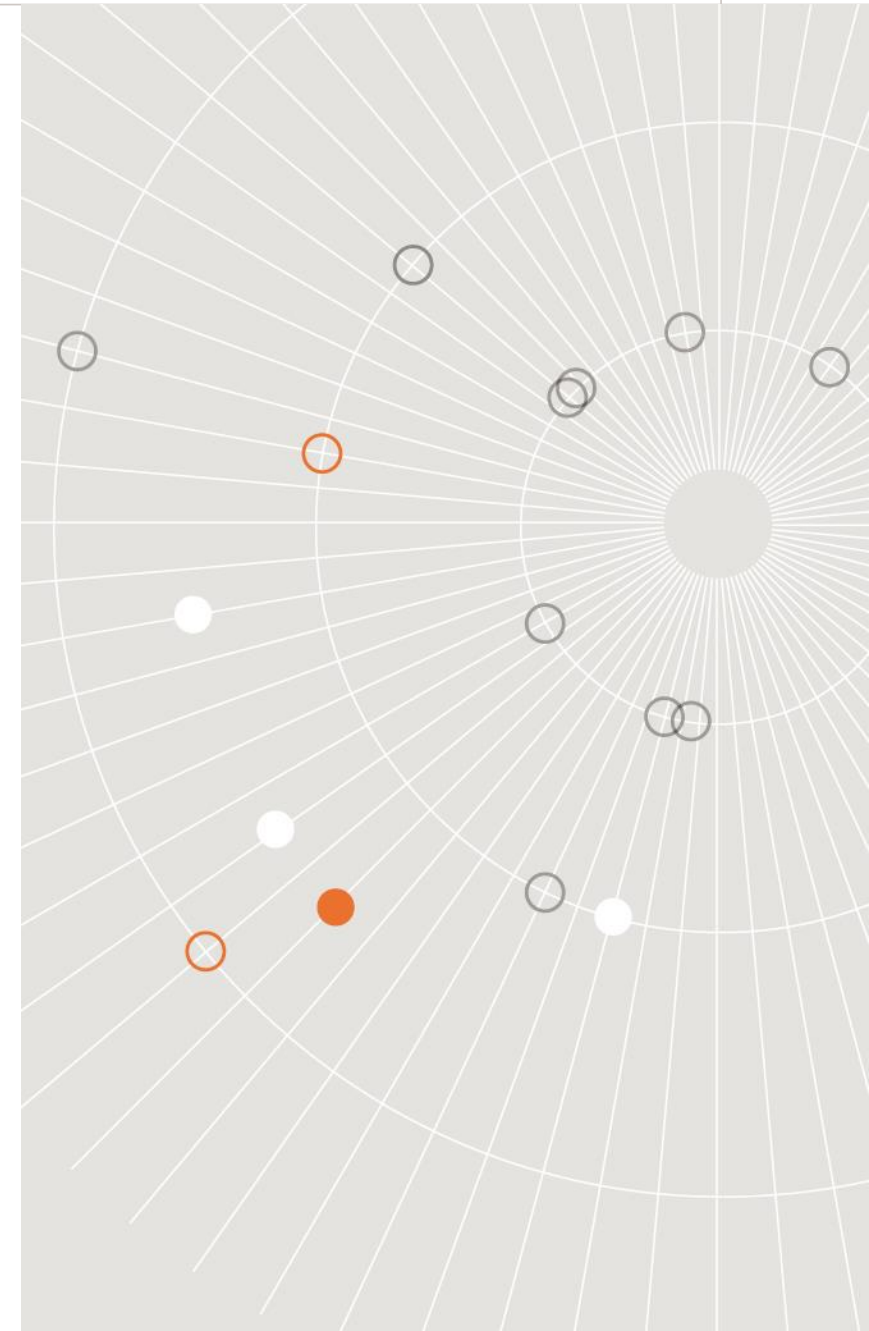

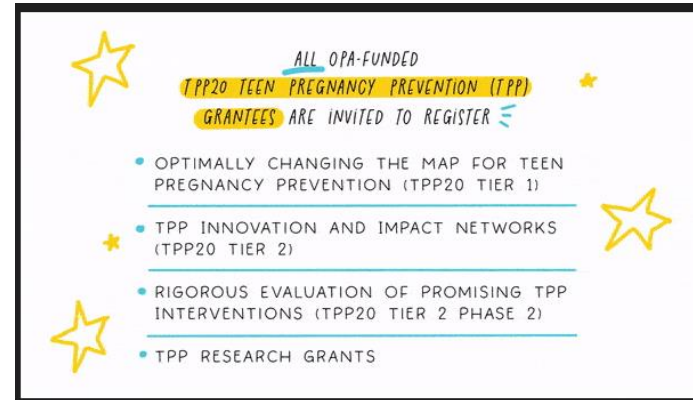
- Five (5) short, animated pictures called Graphics Interchange Format (**GIFs**) were designed to announce:

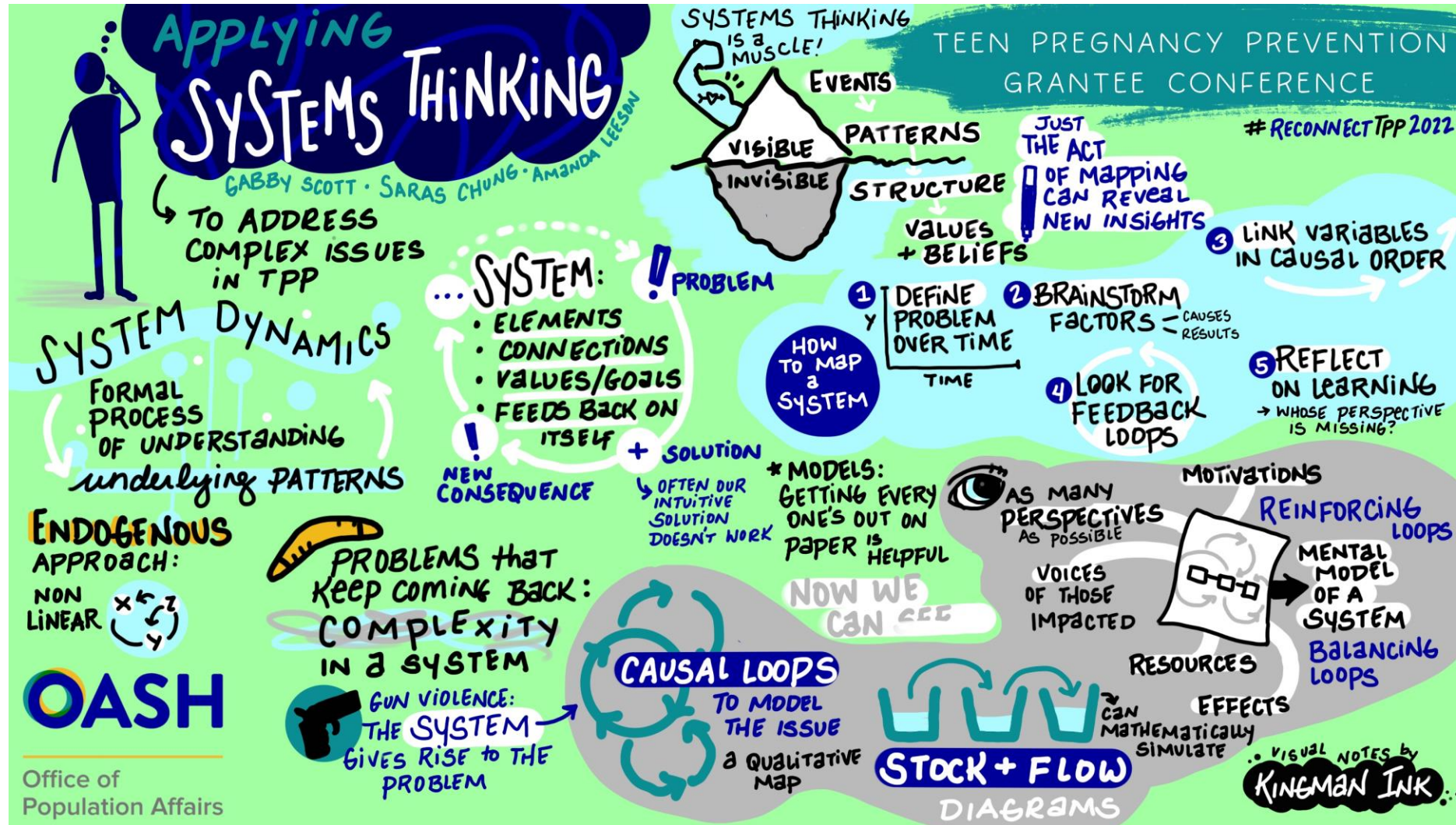

- This networking event brought over 100+ grantees together to collaborate in randomized teams as they put their heads together during the decades-themed rounds of entertainment.



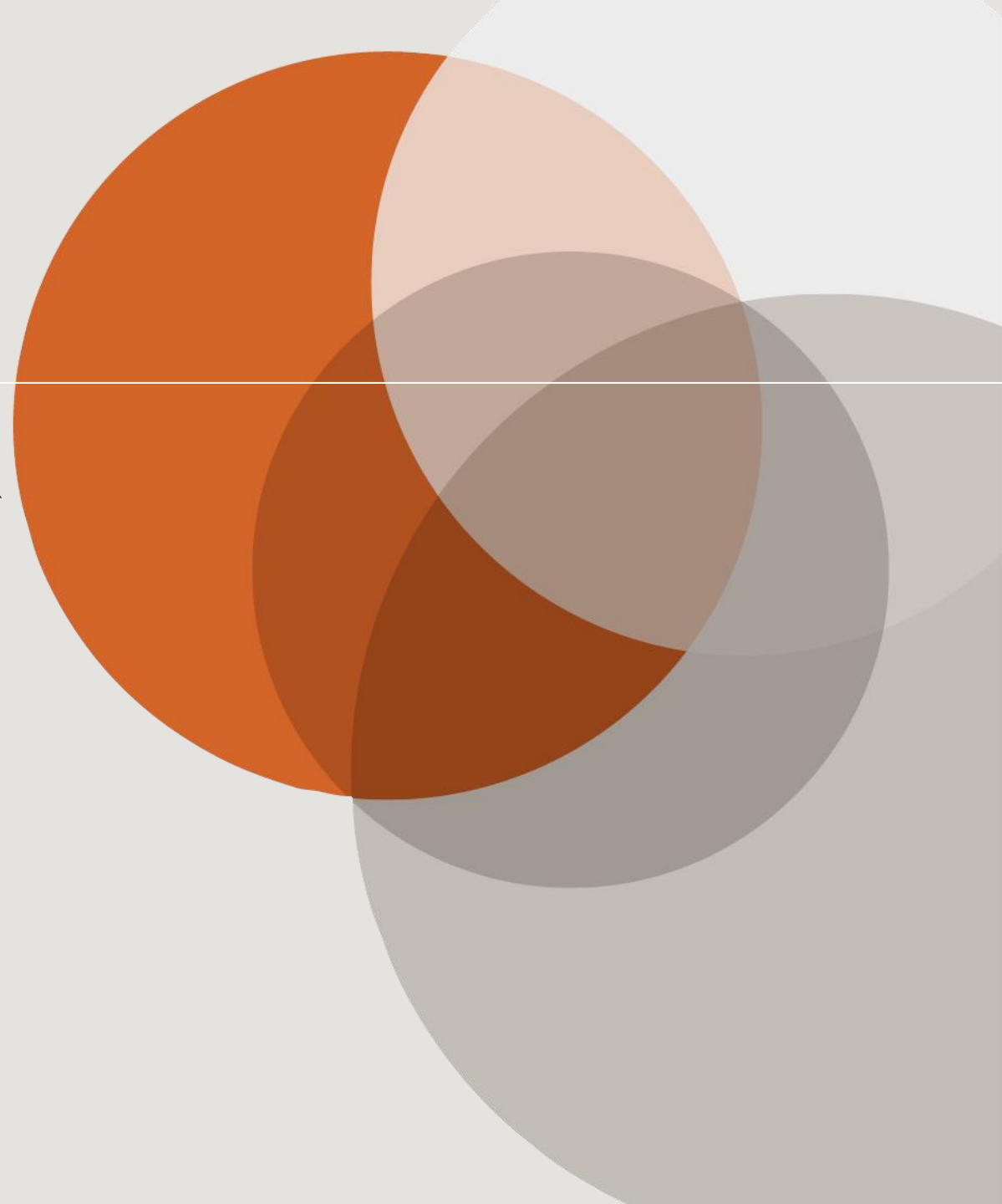
Youth Mental Health First Aid

Youth Mental Health First (YMHFA)

- This year's conferences featured the opportunity for TPP grantees to express interest, register, and complete a Youth Mental Health First Aid certification course hosted through the National Council for Mental Wellbeing.
- Two (2) courses were hosted pre-conference on Monday, July 25, 2022 from 10:00 AM to 4:00 PM ET. Each course had a maximum capacity of 25 seats.
- All learners were required to complete two (2) hours of online, self-paced work prior to the instructor-led session on July 25. The goal of the pre-work was for learners to walk away being able to:
 - Identify the signs and symptoms of a mental health or substance use challenge or crisis.
 - Understand that anyone can experience and recover from a mental health or substance use challenge.
 - Respond to a mental health or substance use challenge or crisis using a 5-step action plan.

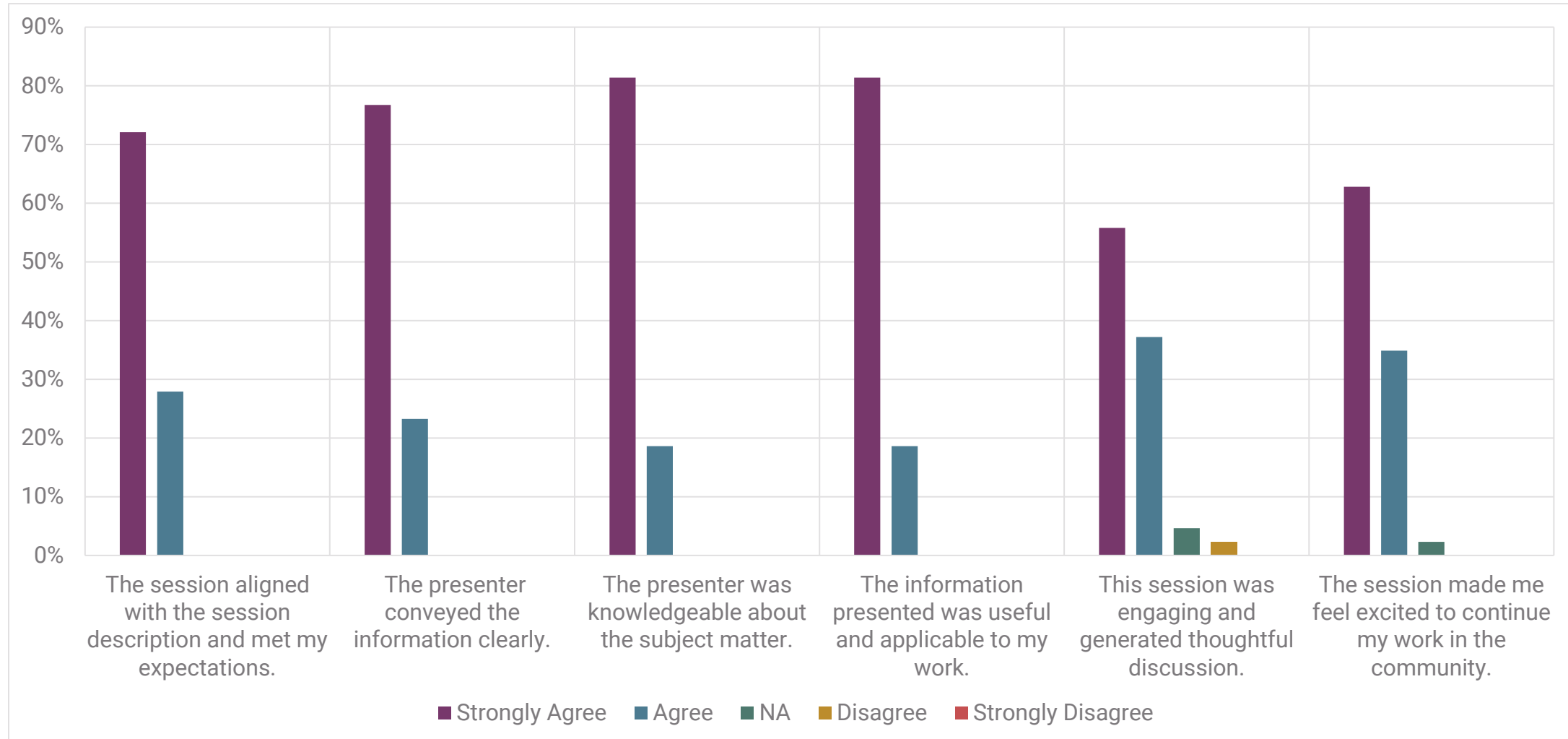
Session Evaluations

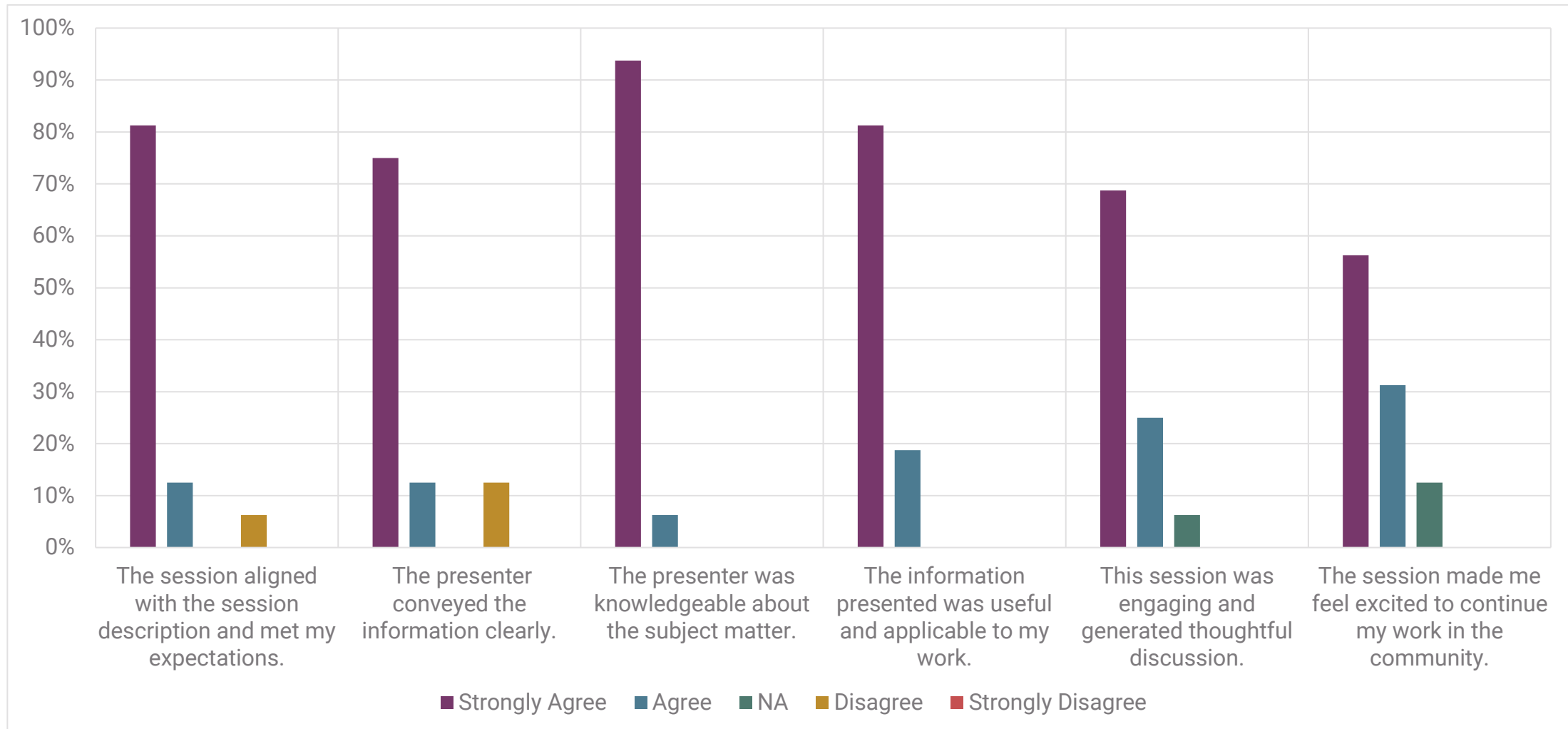

Plenary: Applying Systems Thinking

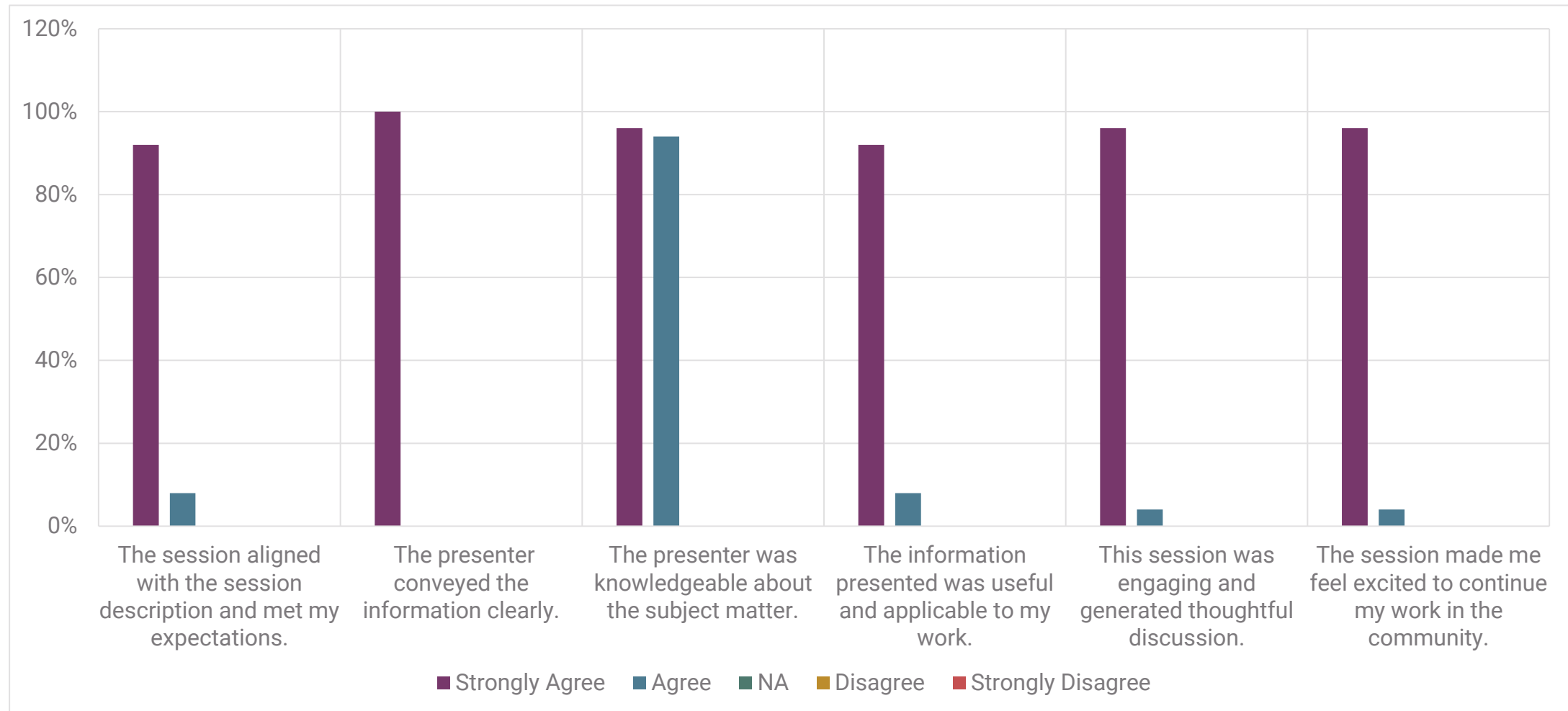

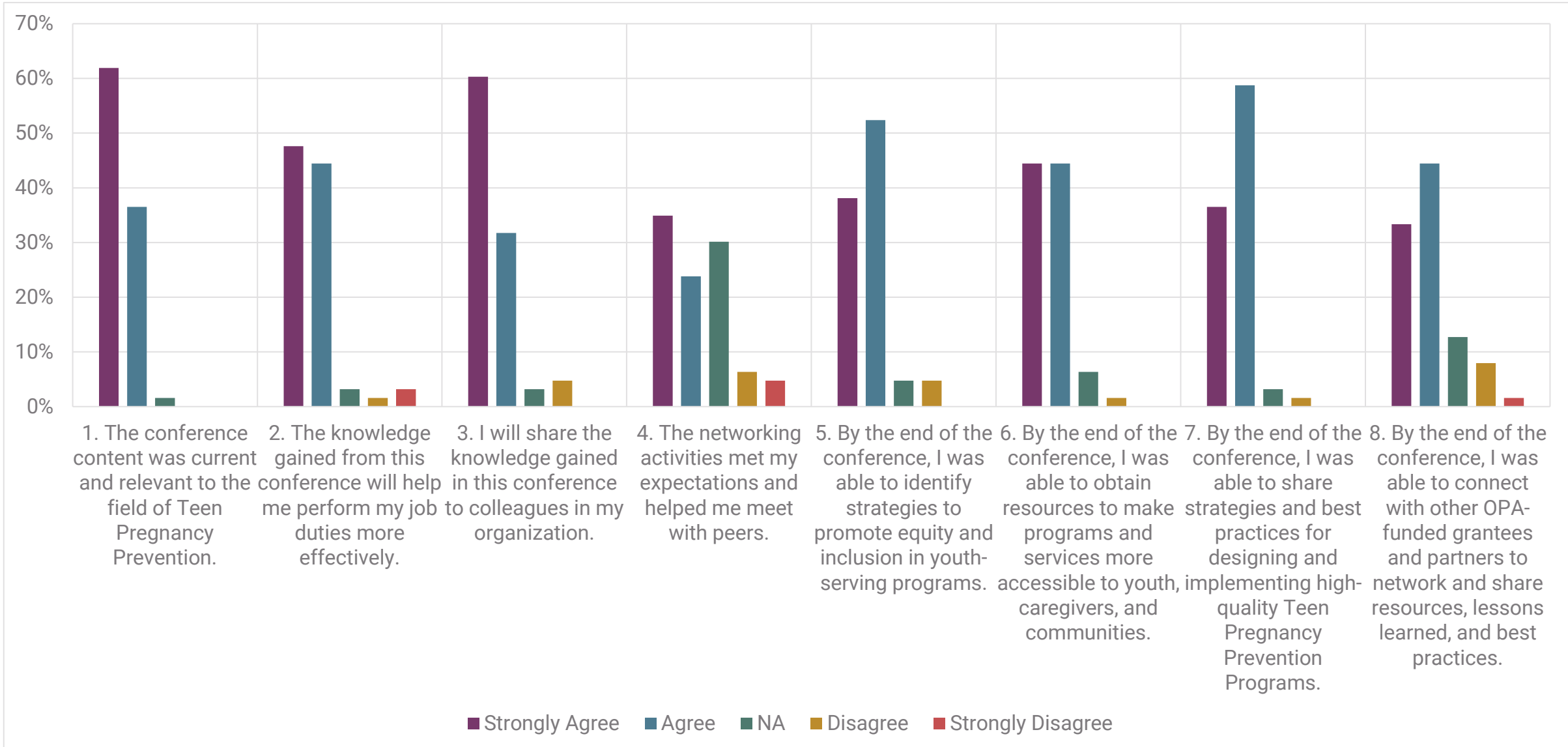

General Event Feedback

- Sixty-four (**63**) participants of **605** submitted feedback on the overall General Event Feedback survey for a ten percent (**10.41%**) response rate.
- Meeting participants were asked to rate their level of agreement or disagreement with **eight (8)** multiple choice questions on a five-point Likert scale rating system (**5** = Strongly Agree, **4** = Agree, **3** = Neutral, **2** = Disagree, and **1** = Strongly Disagree) and **four (4)** open-ended questions.
