Study Methodology

This survey, funded by the Wall Street Journal, was conducted by NORC at the University of Chicago. Staff from NORC at the University of Chicago and the Wall Street Journal collaborated on all aspects of the study.

Data were collected in Ukraine by the local agency Info Sapiens using a random sample of 1,005 Ukrainians aged 18 and older who own a mobile phone number with one of Ukraine's mobile service providers. Mobile numbers in Ukraine have ten digits. The first three digits are the mobile provider code. The last seven digits of the mobile number were generated randomly. Hence, the sample frame covered Ukrainian mobile numbers from the areas of the country under Ukrainian control prior to February 24th, and excluded Crimea and the separatist-controlled parts of Donbas where Ukrainian mobile providers are not used.

Consequently, this nationwide sample frame covered Ukrainians with local mobile numbers who relocated abroad and those from the areas occupied by Russian forces after February 24th. The respondents abroad were offered a small monetary incentive to offset roaming charges for the survey incoming call. Proportions of respondents from both subgroups are lower than their actual share in the population due to Ukrainians' limited use of the Ukrainian sim cards abroad, and switches to Russian mobile operators in the areas that went under Russian control. We estimate these two subgroups are underrepresented by approximately 3 percentage points each compared to their actual share of the population.

A total of 1,005 interviews were conducted between June 9-13, 2022. The numbers were dialed randomly using the CATI method, without quotas, with up to three callbacks. Interviews were conducted by live bilingual interviewers in Ukrainian and Russian, depending on respondent preference.

The overall margin of sampling error is +/- 4.0 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence level, including the design effect. The margin of sampling error may be higher for subgroups. Sampling error is only one of many potential sources of error and there may be other unmeasured error in this or any other survey.

Quality assurance checks were conducted to ensure data quality, including continuous supervision of interviewing and logical checks of completed interviews. In total, 24 cases were dropped after quality control. Once the sample has been selected and fielded, and all the study data have been collected and made final, a poststratification weighting was used to adjust for any survey nonresponse as well as any noncoverage or under and oversampling resulting from the study specific sample design. Poststratification variables included age, gender, region, and urbanicity. Targets for weighting were obtained from the State Statistics Service of Ukraine report, 2021. The weighted data reflect the Ukrainian population of adults aged 18 and over, excluding Crimea and the Donbas areas not under Ukrainian control before February 24th, 2022.

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
